Unit Welfare Officers

What is Domestic Abuse?

Domestic abuse is the pre-meditated, systematic and sustained abuse of an individual within an intimate or family relationship.

This abuse can take many forms but can include physical, emotional, sexual, economic, psychological as well as controlling and coercive behaviour.

Who does it affect?

Domestic abuse can happen to anyone. It is indiscriminate of age, gender, race or social background and will affect one in four women and one in six men during their lifetime.

What is coercive control?

This is an act or pattern of acts, assaults, threats, humiliation and intimidation or other abuse that is used to harm, punish or frighten.

What is stalking or harassment?

This can include the following: sending unsolicited text messages or unwanted gifts; phone calls and/or turning up uninvited.

What is sexual abuse?

This includes any sexual behaviour or activity which you find unacceptable, and can include rape; enforced sex or prostitution; or sexting.

Armed Forces Commitment

Anyone disclosing domestic abuse as either a victim, perpetrator or concerned third party will be supported and provided with appropriate professional specialist interventions and advice.

Individuals will be treated in a professional and caring manner and domestic abuse is not tolerated in the armed forces.

What support is available?

Army Welfare Service (AWS) provide confidential support, independent of the chain of command. Support includes safety planning, advice and information. You can also access support through welfare, police and civilian support services.

SSAFA Social Care provide confidential support for serving RAF personnel and their families.

Safety Plan

Arrange where you might go if you have to leave in an emergency.

Try to keep a phone with you so that you can call for help in an emergency. Get an extra set of keys for the house / car.

Keep the keys, money and anything else you may need in a safe place in case you need to leave quickly.

Try and seek professional advice or access information on a safe computer for more detailed safety planning information.

Foreign and Commonwealth

Try to ensure that your important documents, such as passport, visa and birth certificates are in a safe location and take these with you if you need to leave.

Domestic Abuse Disclosure Scheme ('Clare's Law')

Gives any member of the public the right to ask the police for information that could protect someone from being a victim of attack. See your local civilian police force website for details of how to apply.
